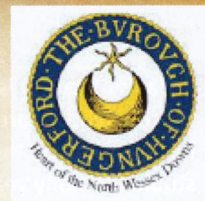


# HUNGERFORD MATTERS...

It will, at the end of the process, have significant influence on the way Hungerford changes once the plan has been sanctioned by a town referendum.

## GRASS CUTTING

I've received many emails and phone calls about the poor state of Hungerford's grass verges and open spaces. Like many of you, I'm deeply disappointed at the maintenance levels in Hungerford. District Councillors James Podger, Dennis Benneyworth and Paul Hewer took our concerns on board and escalated this through WBC. The conclusion was, late snow and heavy rain meant the contractors were behind by a couple of weeks. The verges (when finally cut) left thick arisings which looked extremely unsightly; these should improve with each cut. Personally I've never seen Hungerford look so unloved and I know many of you like me are unhappy. I hope to continue to monitor the situation and perhaps look at alternative solutions to this WBC budget reduction concern.

## LEASE OF THE LIBRARY BUILDING

After nearly 3 years work from the Friends of Hungerford Library and the newly formed charity (established to manage the asset) HTC are thrilled to announce our successful lease of the library building from West Berkshire Council (WBC). The library service will remain with WBC but the charity will run the building and rent it out for community use. This innovative idea has saved the library service and protected our much loved library staff. It's also given HTC a permanent home, and protected this important building for our town. The newly named 'Hungerford Hub' will re-launch on 8th Sept at 10am, please come and support them if you can. Huge thanks to everyone involved, what an incredible outcome for Hungerford!
